My previous Bulletin tribute was to "Life's Building Blocks," books. This month I offer my gratitude and yours to the masons who help us align life's building blocks and mortar them in place. Now....

Tribute to Our Teachers

"Those who can, do. Those who can't, teach."

This isn't precisely the line that British playwright George Bernard Shaw coined in "Man and Superman," but this is how I learned it. Shaw actually wrote, "He who can, does. He who cannot, teaches." Either way, it's wrong.

What teachers do is shape our lives. Can there be anything greater to do? Mind and heart are the rawest of raw materials, *tabula rasa*, according to philosopher John Locke. Teachers take these raw materials and imbue them with facts and ideas, insights and inspirations.

Another British wit, Oscar Wilde, hewed closer to truth in "De Profundis," his spin on Psalm 130, "From out of the Depths." Wilde wrote, "Most people are other people. Their thoughts are other people's opinions..." But Wilde's wry streak couldn't resist hyperbole. Wilde then tumbled headlong over the edge by adding "...their lives a mimicry, their passions a quotation."

So here is where Shaw is right and Wilde is wrong. Shaw wrote, "Life isn't about finding yourself. Life is about creating yourself." Life is creativity, not mere mimicry.

Who are you? To whom and to what do you devote your time and energy? Why and how? What is the life you created?

Your teachers first helped you formulate answers to all these questions. Subsequent teachers then helped you test, temper and fine tune your answers.

Life's first teachers of course are parents. *Horim*, "parents" in Hebrew is the precise analog to *Morim*, "teachers." In turn, both are connected to Torah, "teaching." Behind every book is a teacher, sometimes more than one. Nowhere is this more remarkable than in the dual authorship of Torah. Each time we hoist the Torah and turn in the four directions of the compass, we sing *V'zot HaTorah*, "This is the Torah which Moses placed before the people of Israel from the mouth of God and the hand of Moses." Tradition then asserts Torah's two authors, one human, *Moshe Rabbeinu*, "Moses our teacher," and one divine, the One God. *Dayeinu*? If you think they are teachers enough, Jewish tradition proposes that our teachers are almost as infinite as the Infinite One.

"Who is wise?" asked Ben Zoma, who then answered, "One who learns from everyone."

Three days after the Spring Equinox and two days after my birthday, the number of days to my retirement dwindle down to double digits. More than I now find myself looking ahead, I look back over the years. Teachers burgeon in memory, from kindergarten through high school, college, graduate school and rabbinic seminary, twenty-four years all told as a formal student. Also guitar teachers, and yes, a voice teacher. All made their mark on me, even when I wasn't learning; I should have known better to listen and learn.

Here and now I make special note and offer gratitude for the many lessons I learned from my many teachers during my thirty-eight years here in Pittsburgh. Among them, I learned the following lesson that I have in turn taught many times, especially here at Temple Emanuel where teachers abound.

Everyone I have ever met knows many things far better than I do. Even the

things I know well, there are still many people who know these things far better than I do. As this is true for me, this is true for you.

And here is how profoundly teachers can shape us. They teach us what we do not know, as well as what we know. Thereby they teach us the foundation of moral character: humility.

So what are all of us here to do?

"It has been told to you what is good and what Adonai asks of you: to do justly, to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God." Micah 6:8

Fifteen months. It's been 15 months since Rabbi Mahler announced to the congregation that he is retiring on June 30, 2018. It's hard to believe that we are in the final few months with Rabbi Mahler as our Senior Rabbi. We continue to celebrate and thank him as we set the stage for his transition to Rabbi Emeritus as we look ahead to welcoming Rabbi Donald Rossoff as our Interim Rabbi from July 1, 2018 through June 30, 2019.

When we as a congregation were looking at the next steps in hiring our next rabbi, the Board determined that it was in Temple Emanuel's best interest to hire an interim rabbi. It is a best practice across the Reform movement once a long-tenured rabbi departs to bring in an interim rabbi for one-year. An interim rabbi is trained in helping congregations through transitions and does not apply for the Settled Rabbi position. First, an Interim Rabbi allows us to focus on the next era of our congregation. The Central Conference of American Rabbis (CCAR) states that a synagogue's work with a trained interim rabbi allows time for thoughtful, intentional work, strengthening congregations for a healthy search process. Second, an interim rabbi allows for the next rabbi to have greater success. If an interim rabbi isn't engaged following the departure of a long-tenured rabbi, then the next rabbi often struggles. Finally, bringing in an interim rabbi will offer us the strongest candidate pool as we initiate our search for the next senior rabbi.

Approximately one year ago, we asked for volunteers to be part of the Interim Rabbi Search Committee, chaired by Michelle Markowitz. We had a broad range of demographics represented with 20 Temple members including single, married without children, married with young children, married with Torah Center and B'nei Mitzvah-age children, married with high school age children, empty nesters, interfaith families, new members and long-time members.

We gathered input from you as congregants via an online poll in early September asking about Temple Emanuel, our strengths and areas of opportunity. We had a great response and incorporated those answers into the application.

The Interim Rabbi Search application was submitted the last week of September between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. Applications started to arrive in October. We ultimately had fifteen candidates apply. The Search Committee interviewed eight by video-conference. Three candidates came to Temple Emanuel for in-person meetings with the Search Committee, the Board of Trustees, Rabbi Mahler, Rabbi Locketz, Leslie Hoffman and Iris Harlan. Rabbi Donald Rossoff, or Rabbi Don as he likes to be called, received unanimous approval at the Search Committee, Board of Trustees and at a Special Congregational Meeting to be our Interim Rabbi for this upcoming year. I am pleased to say that Temple Emanuel has our number one choice.

Rabbi Rossoff will be visiting Pittsburgh the weekend of April 6-8 and will attend our First Friday Shabbat Service where all are welcome to meet him and his wife Fran. There will be other opportunities to meet with him upon his arrival in July. We have an exciting year ahead. Thank you.

Frogs Here...Frogs There...

I have a lot of frogs in my office... stuffed frogs of all shapes and sizes. Now, I like frogs, but I am not a frog collector. No – but I am a big fan of the 'Frog Song.'

Perhaps you know it? There are a number of variations, but the one I know goes like this:

One morning Pharaoh awoke in his bed, there were frogs on his head and frogs in his bed, frogs on his nose and frogs on his toes, frogs here, frogs there, frogs were jumping everywhere!

It is indeed a fun song...but I would argue that it is much more fun when there are lots of stuffed frogs to throw around. Try it: a fun time is guaranteed for all. At the very least, it is a more animated way of retelling the story of Passover at the Seder this year.


There are many ways to spice up our Passover celebration. All it takes is a little bit of creativity and a willingness to try something different. So the "Frog Song" isn't your 'cup of tea?' Check out the following "sure to wow them and keep them interested" Seder tricks and find the one (or two, or three!) that will work for you and your Seder guests:

- **Have a Persian Scallion Battle** - This is a Persian custom. During the reciting and singing of *Dayeinu*, when the words "Had God taken us out of Egypt..." are said/sung, Seder participants pick up scallions from their plate. When the word "*Dayeinu*" is said/sung, they hit each other lightly on the back or shoulders with the scallions to remind themselves of how it felt to be slaves.
- **Mix up the Afikomen search** - Instead of hiding the *afikomen* for the children to find, let them hide it! Here's how it works - after the middle *Matzah* is broken and the *afikomen* is wrapped and set aside, let the children "steal" it away from the Seder leader and hide it before the end of the meal. After the meal, the Leader must find it or offer a reward for its return.
- **Play the Alphabet Game** - Go around the table and have each person say, "I am leaving Egypt and I am taking _____. " Everyone must repeat what has been said before and add an item, going according to the alphabet. Be careful not to take anything not Kosher for Passover!
- **Turn your table into a Pyramid-Building Zone** - Provide Seder participants, especially younger ones, with Legos or other building blocks. The pyramids never looked so good!
- **Change the Elijah ritual** - Instead of having a full cup to begin with, explain that the Messianic Time will not come

unless we are all committed to working toward peace and freedom. Ask people to demonstrate their willingness to help by pouring a drop of wine (or juice) from their cup into Elijah's cup. Don't worry about mixing wines – Elijah won't care.


- **Interview the Major (and Not-So-Major) Characters** – Select a volunteer "talk show host" to interview important persons in the story. Choose others to be Moses, Yocheved, Miriam, or even funny, made-up characters such as a frog from the ten plagues or Moses' favorite sheep.
- **Prepare for the Kiddish Countdown**: Before the Seder make cup counters. Draw four cups of wine on construction paper and cut them out for each guest.
- **Relate to the "Four Children"** – There is a little of each of the four children within each of us. Describe situations where you felt wise, wicked, simple, or didn't know how to ask.
- **Join the Trivia Craze** – When the children finish their meal (well ahead of the adults!), ask them to prepare Passover Trivia Questions to ask the adults during dessert.
- **Give awards** – Rabbi Al Axelrod created the "Shifra and Puah Award" that recognizes non-violent resistance to tyranny. Have a discussion with Seder participants. Who should receive the award this year? Are there other awards to give out as well?
- **Update the Music** – This is still a good one so I include it again... The internet continues to provide new Passover music every year. Have a favorite tune? Someone has most certainly rewritten the words to make them fit the Seder table. Feeling creative? Write your own parody – take a melody you are familiar with, and write new words that describe your Passover traditions. Share it at your Seder and enjoy a few laughs (or groans!).
- **Speaking of Musical Parodies...** Look to the internet for a video or two to fill the time in between parts of the Seder or courses of the meal. You will find many options to choose from; more than a few musical groups have recorded their parodies and videos for others to enjoy. Watch a few and then ask guests to vote - which is the cleverest? The silliest?

These are just a few suggestions for making this year's Passover Seder unique. Use them or create your own "seder tricks." The possibilities are endless! However you choose to do it - make this year's Seder the Seder to remember.





Mazal Tov, Rabbi Locketz

During an Executive Session following the January, 2018 board meeting, and in conjunction with the Human Resources Committee, Temple Emanuel's Board of Trustees voted to change Rabbi Jessica Locketz's title from Associate Rabbi & Director of Education to Rabbi & Director of Education. The board felt this change of title was appropriate based on an overview of the practices at many similar sized congregations in the Union of Reform Judaism (URJ).

Rabbi Locketz has served as Temple Emanuel's Associate Rabbi since 2004. Given the length of her service, and Temple's attempts to align with best practices across the Reform Movement, the board felt strongly that this was the best course of action for our congregation. Rabbi Locketz's role and her current duties will remain unchanged at Temple Emanuel.

As we go through the upcoming transition year, the board – with the help of the congregation and professional staff – will continue to evaluate all facets of synagogue life at Temple Emanuel. We are at the beginning of a process, and will be seeking to engage the entire congregation as we move forward.

We are pleased to announce this change of title for Rabbi Locketz. Be sure to congratulate her when you see her during services, at Torah Center, or at any of the life cycle and Jewish holiday events she helps to coordinate and officiate.

Shabbat Cabinets at Many UPMC Hospitals

Within the past eight years, UPMC Presbyterian, UPMC Montefiore, and UPMC Shadyside have all installed Shabbat cabinets and most recently UPMC Magee installed one.

These Shabbat Cabinets offer the comfort of familiar rituals to Jewish patients and their families during difficult times in their lives, and make UPMC hospitals even more welcoming to them.

Many Jewish people find it disorienting to be a patient in a hospital setting because they can't carry out the religious practices that connect them to the Jewish community. A Shabbat Cabinet can help these patients and their families feel more at ease.

The Shabbat Cabinet contains basic supplies for Jewish observance. The materials in the Shabbat Cabinet are intended as one-time use: once they enter a patient's room, they can't be transferred to another patient. The basic contents include: kippot / yarmulkas; battery-powered, electric filament candles; and kosher grape juice and other non-perishable kosher foods. prayerbooks, and other supplies can also be added.

When in the hospital during Shabbat, ask the information desk to show where you can obtain these items.

We Welcome Your Help

Can you imagine what life would be like if you...

- had no home,
- had to sleep in a **different** church or synagogue every week,
- needed to arrive at your sleeping arrangement at 5:30 PM and be ready to depart every morning at 6:00 AM,
- needed to be cheerful eating dinner with people whom you don't know and may never see again.

AND you had to do this with your children!!

Did you know that over 40% of the homeless population is made up of families, and 1 of 4 homeless persons is a child? For the past two years some of our members have been feeding **families who, through no fault of their own, find themselves without a place to call home.**

How can you and your family help? **Once every three months**

- Temple members transport (in the Family Promise van) guests from Crafton to Bower Hill Community Church (BHCC) and return them back the next morning. We pick-up at 5:00 PM and return guests back at 6:00 AM the next day.
- We plan and prepare dinner (5:30-7:00 PM) and eat with the guest families who stay overnight at BHCC.
- Temple families plan and direct an evening activity from 7:00-9:00 PM. This can be a craft, bingo, outdoor activity depending upon the weather, or just sitting and talking with the families.
- Temple members stay overnight sleeping at the church.

What a great way to show by example that everyone is worthy and affirm our Jewish and humanitarian values in small yet important ways, right here in Mt. Lebanon! It's so easy to say 'yes'! The guest families (often with preschool and grade school age kids), need your 'yes! I can!', just one Tuesday evening at a time.

Temple's next time to host is Tuesday, March 27th.

It's easy if we all pitch in (single households, families, retired couples, young and not so young). We are desperately in need of families to host an evening activity. Think of it as a small (10-15 people) party where you provide the games...bingo, arts and crafts...it's up to you. What a great mitzvah project or an opportunity to show your children what a difference a small gesture can make.

If you can't help but want to contribute in other ways we welcome small (Dollar Store) gifts for prizes or a financial contribution towards food. And if you can't make it in March, please mark your calendars for June 12th.

For more than half a century, the skilled craftsmen of Bagel Bakers Union, Local 338, made virtually every bagel in New York City. Even into the 1950s, all members were Jewish and the minutes of its meetings were taken in Yiddish. Local 338 was merged out of existence in 1971, the victim of refrigeration, changing tastes and most notably the introduction of the automated bagel baking machine, but it left behind an absorbing story – one of assimilation, of technology's disruptive impact and, of course, the decline of trade unionism.

Horowitz will draw on newspaper accounts, articles both scholarly and from the popular press, his analysis of NLRB decisions involving the union and his interviews with surviving Local 338 members.



It's hard to believe that Passover is approaching at the end of the month. For something different this year I am writing about an article I read in the **Forward** of May 13, 2016 and saved to share at the appropriate time, which is this month.

I am grateful to Rabbi Mahler for passing along issues to the library, as I enjoy perusing articles about films and other matters of Jewish interest. I am always catching up, so there are many back issues. Anyone is welcome to read the **Forward** when you are hanging out in the library.

The title of the article is, "So, Why on That Night of All Nights, Did We Eat Those Fruit Jelly Slices?" by David Zvi Kalman. It gives a short history of sugared candy. Several paragraphs stood out to me and I quote them here.

"...Many candies die out; the fruit jelly slice—which is too delicate for easy transportation—should have gone extinct in the mass market long ago. What saved it was a gelling agent called agar-agar; it's used in jelly slices and little else. Normally this would be academic, but on Passover it makes all the difference. Since agar-agar is derived from seaweed, it's okay to use."

"...Though Passover is ostensibly about eating matzos, much of the de facto Ashkenazi Passover diet comprises ingredients that the rabbis of antiquity either rarely ate (sugar, seaweed), had never heard of (coffee), or were cultivated in places that the rabbis didn't know existed (potatoes, chocolate and quinoa all originated in the Americas). The success of the fruit jelly slice is the production of a moment in time when Jewish legal interests and American industry accidentally collided."

Personally, I am not a fan of jelly slices, but obviously many people are, or they wouldn't continue to be sold. If you would like to read the entire article, it will be on the main desk of the library.

Don't forget—if you are purchasing new Haggadahs for your seder, there are many single copies in the library to help you choose one that is best for your family.

Tu B'Shevat Every Day

Tu B'Shevat was on January 31, 2018, Tu B'Shevat is....well, every day!

How exactly is that possible? By planting seeds, eating fruits, and taking nature walks! By appreciating what trees give us – shade, beauty, paper and wood! By learning facts about trees and interpreting trees with pencil or paint. By respecting our environment and being guardians of the earth, *Shomrei Adamah*. And by singing songs about trees...day-in and day-out!

Trees, Trees, Trees
Have roots and trunks and leaves
Trees, Trees, Trees
Have buds and fruits and seeds
Trees, Trees, Trees
A home for birds and bees
We all need our
Trees, Trees, Trees

At ECDC it is our intention to interweave Jewish values into what we do – not only on holidays – but every day. This is our challenge and purpose. But even if we can achieve our goal for Tu B'Shevat, can we also celebrate other holidays every day?

With the help of Rabbi Locketz, ECDC Educators are reflecting on these questions. Currently we are studying Purim. Admittedly Tu B'Shevat makes it easy for us – Purim does not. How would it be possible to celebrate Purim every day? Certainly we are not baking hamantaschen and shaking groggers at the name of Haman on a daily basis. However, as we study the sources, we learn the underlying precepts:

In the Book of Esther, we read that Purim is a time for "feasting and merrymaking," as well as for "sending gifts to one another and presents to the poor" (Esther 9:22). In addition to reading the *M'gillah* (Book of Esther), celebrants dress in costumes, have festive parties, perform "Purim-spiels," silly theatrical adaptations of the story of the *M'gillah*, send baskets of food (*mishloach manot*) to friends, and give gifts to the poor (*matanot l'evyonim*).

These are known as the four mitzvot of Purim:

- Reading (and listening to) the *M'gillah* (Book of Esther)
- Feasting and merry making
- Giving baskets of food to friends (*Mishloach Manot*)
- Giving gifts to the needy (*Matanot L'Evyonim*)

Suddenly it becomes clear that we can celebrate Purim at ECDC every day – **by reading and listening; facing each day**

with good cheer; by giving to friends, by thinking of others who have greater needs.

Daily interweaving of Jewish values is a foundational tenet of the Pittsburgh Jewish Early Childhood Education Initiative (JECEI), a program supported by the Jewish Federation of Greater Pittsburgh. We are grateful to Rabbi Locketz and the Pittsburgh JECEI consultants for their partnership on this journey. Rather than beginning and ending celebrations strictly by the calendar, we are in search of the values that apply on a daily basis. As we next prepare for Passover, we will continue to ask "how do the lessons of the holiday apply to us?" At ECDC it is Tu B'Shevat every day...and at ECDC we hold the spirit of Purim close to our hearts - every day.

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
