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From Rabbi Aaron Meyer

Sovereign of the universe, in awe and humility I have come to stand before You to pray with Your people Israel and on their behalf. Who is fit for such a task?* I can remember listening to my grandfather weep as he recited the inspiration for this prayer before leading the Sharon, PA community in worship. Yamim Nora'im, the name we use for the days between Rosh HaShana and Yom Kippur, can be translated as either the Days of Awe or the Days of Fear; and, when thinking about our transgressions over the past year, we have little doubt which is more accurate. With awe and fear intermingled, and with great humility, I join Rabbi Locketz in the leadership of this community at a spiritually auspicious time.

Yet You are present to us whenever our volces rise in praise. In Your great mercy, have compassion on me and on us all. Compassion — care, love, and leniency — is a tender mercy, particularly during a period of transition. Transitions always evoke feelings of loss and feelings of excitement, feelings that will be amplified in this sacred season. We are grateful for Rabbi Mahler's 38 years of leadership in this community, and we embrace our final year with Dr. Charles Cohen as our cantorial soloist. Both have given so much to strengthen and enrich Temple Emanuel, heightening our feelings of loss, yet we hold abundant hope and excitement for the future. We know that engagement with synagogues is becoming increasingly episodic and transactional, and it is increasingly clear that synagogues can no longer count on 'doing what they've always done to get what they've always got.' Together we must vision and plan for the synagogue of tomorrow while discerning and embracing the highest values of today. It is a process that will come with frustration, missteps, and ultimately the continuity and viability of our sacred community; we ask God's compassion - care, love, and leniency - on us all.

Let my congregation not faiter on my account, nor I on theirs. Guide the lips of those who lead Your people in worship. High Holy Day sermons offer rabbis an important public pulpit from which to express their highest values and aspirations, always in concert with the perceived needs and concerns of their community. In my first year at Temple Emanuel, I suspect - and hope - that there will be considered scrutiny of my offerings. On Erev Rosh HaShana, I will strive to bring alive the words of our ancient tradition, turning them and turning them again to find new guidance and meaning in our day; a style similar to what you might expect during Shabbat worship. On Rosh Hashanah morning, I will present for your consideration a vision for Temple Emanuel's future as a vibrant wellspring of progressive Jewish life in the South Hills. We will all be enriched by Rabbi Locketz's erudition during Kol Nidre services, and on Yom Kippur morning I will speak to a pressing concern from our contemporary world that keeps me awake at night and hinders the full expression of our Jewish values in America.

Strengthen our faith and purify our thoughts, and let Your love draw a vell over all our failings. So may our prayers ascend this day to the throne of Your glory. One of my favorite teachings related to the High Holy Days is that of each human being connected to God by a rope. When that rope breaks, and is later fixed with a knot, we become even closer to our God than before. Our errors, our mistakes, and our missteps, when properly mended, allow us to grow. May our failings be fewer and our strength of faith greater as I begin my rabbinate at Temple Emanuel and together we usher in the year 5780.

L'shanah Tovah - For a sweet, healthy, and happy New Year.

* This prayer, a meditation which captures our sense of inadequacy before God, precedes the haunting melody of Kol Nidre on Yom Kippur Evening.

Thriving Jewishly

What would Jewish education look like if its purpose was to ensure that Jewish tradition empowers students to thrive in today's world?

That is the question being asked in educational communities throughout the Jewish world. I was fortunate to attend a conference sponsored by the Jewish Education Project (https://www.jewishedproject.org/) at the end of May that addressed this topic. Titled "The Why & How of Thriving in Jewish Education" it was an incredible opportunity to think about what is working in Jewish education and....what is not. At the core of the discussion is rethinking religious education, changing from pedagogies that encourage 'surviving' to those that create the right environment for 'thriving.'

It is an important reframing of the way we teach. Over the summer I met with the faculty in small groups to try to understand how this could play out in the Torah Center, what it means to thrive Jewishly, and how we can create the environment to ensure that our students do. First, we had to understand the difference between 'surviving' and 'thriving.' In a Jewish context, 'surviving' is transmitting tradition in an attempt to ensure the Jewish future. [Think: Jewish Continuity, the buzzword of Jewish education when many of us were in religious school]. The approach of 'surviving' is to teach text, history, language and prayer – all because these are the things students *ought to know* in order to understand and perpetuate the type of Jewish life practiced in their (our!) community. Jewish education taught this way has a historical orientation; the past teaches us how to be in the future.

'Thriving' on the other hand, educates for the present, seeking to engage the student while helping to create connection and meaning. In essence, 'thriving' is about relevancy to the learner. It is a call to us educators to find a way to relate to our traditions in a modern, developmentally appropriate and meaningful way, one that can be put into immediate use.

My sense that the pedagogy of 'survival' didn't work as well as intended was confirmed at the conference. There I learned from my colleagues what I already knew; for many Jews, especially those who do not live in traditional communities, much of the content taught as part of their Jewish education seems irrelevant and completely disconnected from their lives.

This disconnect suggests that the methodology of 'surviving' disenfranchises and alienates. The Jewish Education Project posits that the approach of 'thriving' does the opposite. It has the power to create meaning and relevancy that will lead to lifelong Jewish communal engagement and connection.

So what does this mean for us?

The Torah Center faculty and I are excited about making our students 'thrive.' We are busy rethinking the way we teach and interact with our students. For example, when Kindergarten learns about Shabbat, they will learn about the rituals of lighting the candles, blessing the wine and Challah. They will

also explore the meaning of the word Shabbat, 'to rest' and how they can create Shabbat moments in their own lives. The focus will be on the essence of Shabbat – how taking time to rest and slow down can enrich our lives. In this way, Shabbat becomes a sort of mindfulness technique, an opportunity for even our youngest students to learn how to take time for themselves or with family to celebrate Shabbat – with or without the rituals – in a meaningful way.

Another example: when 2nd grade learns about Creation, they will talk about what was created on each of the six days. They will discuss how God created (by speaking) and how when God completed the work, God rested and enjoyed the fruits of God's labors. They will also talk about the act of creating, how they create in their own lives. Do they plan things out? Do they simply plunge into the work? Do they seek help or do it alone? We sometimes look at the Creation story as an explanation for Shabbat, understanding the telling as the need to take a day of rest when the work of the week is done. But - can we also understand Creation as a reminder that we can be like God in another way - as a creator? We can encourage creativity as being yet another way that we are created in God's image. We can also surmise that when we create, the work we do is holy. Through sharing the ways they create, students will understand that they have much to offer.

These examples provide a just a glimpse into how we hope to adapt this new approach to the classroom. To me it is abundantly clear that our success will depend not only on skill acquisition and knowledge mastery but also our ability to help our students to thrive by relating what they learn to their own lives.

As the year begins, there will be much to share. Look for recaps of daily discussions and follow up questions to continue the conversation at home. Check out the forthcoming opportunities to engage online and in person with teachers and other parents. Take advantage of the adult learning sessions that will begin after the High Holidays and learn how you can thrive too.

Items needed: candles, two candlesticks, wine, wine cups for each family member, challah (preferably round), decorative challah cover, holiday bread knife, apple slices, dishes of honey, and centerpiece of flowers for atmosphere.



Time of home service: When the entire family gathers aroud the table on the Eve of Rosh HaShana, Sunday, September 29th before the Holy Day dinner.

Order of Service:

READER:

O Lord, we gather tonight with our loved ones to usher in the New Year. We earnestly pray that it will be a year of love, happiness and peace for our family, for the Jewish people, and for all humanity. May the old year and its ills end now together. May the New Year and its blessings begin now together. (Candles are lit)

Western Wall

(Anytime Gift Idea)

The Wall of Remembrance relief sculpture, an impressionistic rendering of Jerusalem's Western Wall, was dedicated in May 1993, through the generosity of Temple Emanuel Brotherhood; the children and grandchildren of Lillian and Hyman Freeman; Sandra Gitelman and her daughters, Joan and Leslie, in memory of Melvin B. Gitelman; and Barbara and Jim Goldman in honor of their aunt, Frances Rafael.

Conceived in four sections that complement the stained glass windows with which they alternate in our upstairs entryway, this innovative design, by Pittsburgh's New Guild Art and Design Studio artists David Korns and David Miriello, was created to commemorate the meaningful events and people that touch the lives of our Temple family.

Each of the four panels contains dedicatory bronze plaques reminiscent of the petitionary notes left by visitors to Jerusalem's Western Wall. Memorial plaques intermingle with honorials. Inscriptions honor parents, children and grandchildren, recording births, b'nai mitzvot, confirmations and weddings. An ever increasing number of plaques have been purchased by groups of friends and family members to honor a special birthday or anniversary, or to memorialize a beloved friend or relative.

Plaques are available in three sizes: 1" x 3" for \$360; 3" x 4" for \$750; and 4" x 5" for \$1500 payable in monthly installments. For further information and/or to select the plaque of your choice call the Temple office, 412.279.7600.

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
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
